
"To Timothy Puddephatt – Chairman of BABA – and to all BABA Members

C an it really be forty years ago that, encouraged by ABANA and the terrific American enthusiasm for the creative possibilities offered by forged steel, a small group of blacksmiths gathered together at Rowhurst Forge in Leatherhead and founded BABA?


One of the great benefits of being a part of what is often referred to by members as an extended family, is the spur to travel all over the UK (and even further afield) to the events. That it doesn't always meet for its conferences, forge-ins, masterclasses and AGM in the same place each year is one of BABA's enormous strengths – we are introduced to places and people we may never have encountered or been inspired by, from coast to capital. Having been at many Council meetings, I love the discussions about potential venues for future events, and the desire to keep it fair and moving from north to south and east to west and "We haven't been to Wales for a while now...".

So it was that after BABA visited Hastings on the south coast for the first time ever in 2016, and headed up a bit and west to Hereford in 2017, the AGM moved further north in 2018 to a new (and very atmospheric) industrial venue: the Kelham Island Museum in Sheffield.

This was the kind of quiet event we have all been asking for. A calm chance – between the noisy, busy, exhilarating big projects – to talk, to consider, to learn, to catch up. The AGM itself was focused and productive, without the common situation where key people have to simultaneously 'mind the shop' and attend to ongoing forging and public engagement activity. Even then, the hours sped by and there was not really enough time to debate the future of the craft and BABA in this very challenging era of uncertainty, time poverty and rapid change. We need a week...

Two precious moments stayed in my mind: Robert and Carol Smith were rewarded again for the superb work they have done with their team for BABA Children's Forging, when Chairman Tim Puddephatt presented them with the Addy Taylor Cup; and BABA Newsletter Editor Norman Brammer stood up and reminisced about his Sheffield past – he was born to a 'Little Mester' close to Kelham Island in 1938.





And then on to the Conference element and two very different and very wonderful guest speakers.

Richard Lewis – silver medallist of the Worshipful Company of Blacksmiths – gave a talk about his career, and a running commentary to a screening of a film made about his forge while it was still operating. Richard has supported BABA in the past, producing specialist forgings for many members over the years, and also introducing everyone to Progen industrial tool steel. He featured in AB96, demonstrating power-hammer forging at Terry and Sally Clark's 'Weekend of Learning' in November 2000. There cannot be many people in the world who can offer such a wealth of practical, technical and cultural information on so many aspects of blacksmithing, so it was an extraordinary privilege to be in the audience.

And the audience participated! Questions were asked as the film was showing, and it transpired that several delegates had used Richard's skills and products in the past. This was an unexpected bonus – matching commissioned objects to commissioners who could add extra information about the jobs concerned.







The sadness of a forge closing down was tempered with the realisation that the machines and tools had gone on to new homes – there were calls from the floor as specific items were shown in operation: "So-andso has that now", "That one went to so-and-so", and so on..



I would have bought my ticket and driven to Sheffield just for Richard's interesting and wholly authentic presentation – it was like a gentle and mesmerising one-man theatre play.


Then it was Grace's turn, and an enthralling presentation that had us all captivated. Grace Horne is a fabulous woman and a *brilliant* designer-maker. Cutler and corsetière, Grace works in an old public toilet built in the early 1900s for tram drivers. She exudes flair, wit, style and passion, and she has an

academic approach and an engineering brain that will explore all avenues and stubbornly tackle any technical obstacle that dares to compromise the desired outcome. Aesthetically, much of her precise work has that appealing sense of period allure, decadence and danger that is becoming so popular again today in film and TV; she can make anything, to an outrageously high standard, and many of her pieces are strikingly modern, but for me it is





the scissors that combine her metalworking, engineering, textile and academic research skills which are the most definitively 'her'. Grace showed us examples of these, handing them round and explaining the design and technical processes involved. They are gorgeous and intriguing, and she shared a tale of Sheffield's social history, where prostitutes - forbidden to carry sharp weapons to defend themselves - had styled themselves as 'seamstresses', who were allowed to carry scissors...











Grace finished by donning a beard she had knitted in honour of blacksmiths, and we all retired to the bar and our 'proper Northern Tea' (amazing pie!). For those able to spare the Sunday as well, there was free entry to the Kelham Island Museum to see the River Don Engine in full steam (a 1904-built steam engine used for hot-rolling plate) and the extensive Hawley Collection of tools and 'tools that make tools'.

I drove home late on the Saturday night, and grabbed the opportunity to call in for a quick reviving coffee with Sheffield friends who have bought an old coach house. They asked my advice about the iron door and fire furniture, and it was intriguing to see so many witch marks – another article for another time...



What a terrific, stimulating day, so full of camaraderie and inspiration – none of which would have happened if BABA hadn't happened forty years ago.





The Demonstrators

Will Maguire - Australia australia.www.willblacksmith.com

Will Maguire trained initially as an industrial blacksmith in Australia, then spent several years as a journeyman overseas, working, learning and collaborating with some of the best smiths in England, USA, Russia, Europe, Ukraine and Japan. Will is currently one of a few contemporary blacksmiths in Australia combining his contemporary designs with traditional forging skills creating innovative practical and sculptural work.

On Will's visit to the UK he will do a masterclass in Scotland at Ratho Byres Forge on 14th & 15th September, this will limited to 15 delegates. The figurative sculptural piece created will be brought to the AGM & Expressive Metals Conference for everyone to enjoy.

At the AGM Will plans to explore the human form in closer detail and will demonstrate the expressive nature of soft iron by capturing a varied sense of human emotion working at the anvil with fullers and a striker.

There will also be a presentation from Will on the work he creates at his forge in the Hunter Valley, New South Wales.

Charles Lewton-Brain - Canada www.ganoksin.com/member/charleslewtonbrain

Charles Lewton-Brain is a master goldsmith. He trained, studied and worked in Germany, Canada and the United States. A world renowned author, educator, artist and former teacher and Program Head at Alberta College of Art and Design, Lewton-Brain has been recognised globally for his art work, and received Canada's highest honour for Craft, The Saidye Bronfman Governor Generals Award. He was one of the founders of the Canadian Craft Federation, Canada's national organisation, and served as President for over two years.

Credited with inventing fold forming, a metal smithing technique recognised the world over as the only new, original innovation in metal working in millennia, Charles will demonstrate fold forming techniques using copper sheet at the BABA AGM. Fold forming uses the metal's flexibility to make complex forms resembling chased, constructed and soldered shapes. For those captivated by the forms that can be created through fold forming, the techniques that Charles will demonstrate can be transferred to be used in steel allowing the blacksmith the ability to create organic sinews forms not always possible to achieve by forging. This is a wonderful opportunity to add another skill and way of thinking to your own practise as an artist blacksmith. Charles will also give a presentation of his work.

Cara Wassenberg - United Kingdom carawassenberg.com

Cara Wassenberg is a metalsmith, teacher, and sculptor. Although she is originally from a fine art background, during her career she has consistently developed her skills in metal working. Following an initial introductory year spent at Hereford College of Technology she learnt from craftspeople in Germany, the US and England. She is fascinated by the process and has more recently learnt more about the casting of glass. Her preferred sculptural materials are iron and copper.

Cara will give a power point presentation titled Material, Method and Making Your Way.

In this talk she would like to share with you some of her educational experiences, the places people, workshops and materials that influenced her and continue shape her work practice today.

Catering

"INNER SPACE"

Personal expressions in metal forming: Interior pieces for the home.

This is an opportunity to design and make something unique for that 'inner-space', the home interior.

Organized by Steve Rook, initially, this exhibition will take place at the BABA AGM 20th to 22nd September at the National School of Blacksmithing, Holme Lacy, Hereford.

Should you agree, your piece or pieces entered for 'INNER SPACE' will then go on to be exhibited at Fire & Iron Gallery in Surrey for the Mole Valley "Arts Alive Festival" one of the biggest community arts festivals in Surrey, comprising around 80 local events taking place throughout October 2024. Otherwise, you may take your work away at the end of the conference.

Dimensions:

- It must fit within an imaginary cuboid measuring no more than 400mm x 400mm x 1000mm.
- The work does not need to fit the space closely. It can be smaller, much smaller if you wish.
- The finished work must be either completely stable and free-standing, or it could equally hang on a wall.
- The work can be positioned horizontally, vertically or at an angle, so the space to fill could be a metre high or a metre wide or 'tilted' as long as the other two dimensions are both within 400mm.
- The piece should be thoughtfully designed and explore/demonstrate the skills of the blacksmith.

Entry form and date:

Please email Steve at **secretay@baba.org.uk** and we will send an entry form which will contain further information. To help us plan, we will need to know what is coming, how it is arriving, etc.

If your work moves on to Fire and Iron Gallery, please give consideration as to how it will be protected during transport.

The closing date for return of entry forms will be the 31st of August. Work for exhibition would need to arrive on the 19th or 20th September.

On to Fire & Iron Gallery

Fire & Iron's director, Lucy Quinnell, would like each maker to provide a paragraph about themselves and their work, and she can help with this if required. This is your chance to promote yourself to a wider audience, and to get feedback regarding public reaction to your work. It is likely that unsold work could remain on display beyond the end of the festival, to give it a longer time period and a greater chance of selling.

• All work must be safe for exhibition purposes and fit for sale. Your work will be for sale unless you wish otherwise. This is a great opportunity to get paid for what you have made for the AGM and to get your name and work in front of the general public as well as invited professionals such as architects, interior designers and garden designers.

• Sadly, Fire & Iron Gallery cannot accept any lighting these days without the full (and prohibitively expensive!) regulatory requirements. An electrical test is no longer sufficient.

• All work will be insured while in Fire & Iron Gallery's care.

A few words from Lucy Quinnell:

"Go for it. Do the very best work you are capable of and finish it beautifully. Exhibiting work in public is your chance to shine, and who knows where it will lead? There is still a reassuring public thirst for really high-quality, interesting work, finished well.

My advice is to imagine a client and aim for something they will want to live with for the rest of their lives; something that will make them smile every single time they see it, or even use it, if it has a function beyond artwork. Picture it in their home, with visitors, children, pets, and cleaners. Where will it go? How will it work with the rest of their space? Is it safe? Is it compliant? And so on. I look forward to seeing some really exciting work."

Designing, measuring and making sure it stays put. An introduction to making site-work work for you at either end of a job!

A workshop led by Adam Booth - Pipers Forge, Jim Whitson - The Blazing Blacksmith and Pete Hill - Ratho Byres Forge - over 100 years of collective experience and making mistakes, so you don't have to!

Hosted at the forge of Kelly Burton, located in the midst of the Northamptonshire countryside. Old Dairy Farm, Upper Stowe, Northants, NN7 4SH.

Saturday the 9th November and Sunday the 10th November 2024 (£100pp)



This weekend event will be a chance to learn about some of the possible approaches to both the preparatory stages of a project and the final installation. The weekend will include discussion, demonstrations and hands on opportunities.

First day topics will include designing for a specific location, site survey techniques and approaches, apps to make this easier, thinking ahead, looking for issues, problem solving and tools that can make the measuring process easier and more accurate. We will undertake a hands-on demo surveying existing openings with the opportunity to have a go. Discussion of design approaches will follow with a focus on identifying the site parameters and restrictions that might guide the design process.



On the second day the focus will be on installing and fixing your work, fixing types and their uses, advantages and disadvantages with hands-on demos with tips and tricks. This will include most relevant fixing options, such as mechanical anchors, resin fixings and hot lead, with different drilling options and the chance to try these out.



Time allowing there will be a couple of presentations showcasing past projects, showing how the site influenced the design and how they were installed.



It is planned the event will take place from 10am - 5pm on Saturday and 10am till 3pm on Sunday. Hopefully folk can get together Saturday evening for a beer and to talk smithing.

Lunch for both days will be included at the onsite café (buffet style) and will be included in the ticket price, along with refreshments. The event will be limited to a maximum of 20 attendees.

While we are unable to offer camping at this time of year, there is limited parking for folk with campervans (6 ONLY) first come first serve basis at an additional £10 per night, who can park up at the venue. There is no shortage of budget hotels within 5 or 6 miles.

Adjustable spanner

Hint: You can clamp a raw material with the same cross-section as the twisted material on one mouth-side. This allows working with a larger lever without damaging the adjustable spanner.

WORKSHOP SALE

I'm hoping to rehome and some of the other machinery I should like to dispose of. Notes and photos are below.

All equipment was in working order when they stopped being used and they have been kept in their original locations in a weatherproof, unheated building. To the best of our knowledge the only deterioration has been surface rusting but there's also a general need for lubrication. Presses

Manual Press. This is in good order. It is currently set up as a guillotine but I believe it has a die set for the Aberaeron pattern shovel.

The photos opposite show the press in its original and current condition. The video (link below) shows it in operation.

Power Press. This is powered by a separate electric motor. The motor turns freely by hand but I haven't powered it up and the belt connection to the press is absent. The press has die sets for a number of spade / shovel designs.

The photos show the press in original and current condition, and also some of the stamped spades/shovels and die sets. The video shows the main drive can be turned by hand and drives the flywheel but I can't move the lever to engage the flywheel with the piston so I can't show this in operation. Other Machinery

Shaping Machine. This is belt-powered by a separate electric motor.

Stand-mounted Pillar Drill. Belt powered by a separate electric motor. I occasionally use this and video shows it running.

Grinder. Powered by internal electric motor. I occasionally use this and video shows it starting and running.

Metal Cutting Saw. I'm not sure how this is powered. It would appear to have a pulley for a belt Manual Sheet Metal Rolls Needs cleaning but in working order.

Site Access There are limitations on site access. The forge building is close to a narrow public road which is some 500yards from a larger B-road. The width of the road makes it unsuitable for very large lorries – artics are a definite no-no! As a guide, it can be comfortably accessed by Builders Merchant delivery vehicles (eg Travis-Perkins / Jewsons). The entrance to the forge yard is wide but slopes down towards the forge. Turning for large vehicles is difficult and most drivers prefer to reverse back down to the B-road.

Blacksmiths Workshop to Let
