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
Editors Notes

P.s. Keep those emails and information coming.






WHAT IS BABA & WHY JOIN?

*Eurythmy – http://www.eurythmy.org.uk/ More than just 'Dance', Eurythmy is an expressive movement art originated by Rudolf Steiner in conjunction with Marie von Sivers in the early 20th century. Primarily a performance art, it is also used in education, especially in Waldorf schools, and as a movement therapy.

http://www.steinerwaldorf.org.uk/whatissteinereducation.html Steiner schools are always co-educational, fully comprehensive and take pupils from three to ideally eighteen. They welcome children of all abilities from all faiths and backgrounds.

The priority of the Steiner ethos is to provide an unhurried and creative learning environment where children can find the joy in learning and experience the richness of childhood rather than early specialisation or academic hot-housing. The curriculum itself is a flexible set of pedagogical guidelines, founded on Steiner's principles that take account of the whole child. It gives equal attention to the physical, emotional, intellectual, cultural and spiritual needs of each pupil and is designed to work in harmony with the different phases of the child's development. The core subjects of the curriculum are taught in thematic blocks and all lessons include a balance of artistic, practical and intellectual content. Whole class, mixed ability teaching is the norm.

Olympic Globe

My Art Residency at Portsmouth Grammar School

I was asked to consider a residency at Portsmouth Grammar School for the Autumn term 2011 by the Head of Art. This involved working with thirty-four Year 10 art students (in their first year of studying for their GCSEs) to create a piece of sculpture for the school grounds. It was decided that being so close to the Olympics, this was an appropriate theme, and (after approval from headmaster, groundsmen, etc.) the best location would be the school playing fields. I decided to stick to a known "globe" template that I have used often in my own work and devised that the pupils could each make three individual copper/aluminium discs which could be attached to a 1000mm diameter global steel frame.

The residency itself was a bit different from the norm, in that although I had a space in the art department, mainly for showcase purposes, it was soon clear that all the facilities needed were technology-related, so the tech department, located down a floor and across an alleyway, gave me a base and use of their tools.

From the beginning of the project it was the logistics that needed the most grappling with - how to ensure that 34 pupils all got something of a worthwhile experience, and produced a piece of high quality copperwork suitable for inclusion in a

public sculpture (given that many of them hadn't even held a hammer or a piece of copper before). We had the Autumn term (about 12 weeks) to achieve this.

On the plus side, the 14/15 year old children were for the most part highly motivated, knowing that all the work would be documented for their GCSE coursework, as well as the actual physical discs being part of a long-standing piece of sculpture.

After a short introductory talk about my own work, an explanation of the project brief and a slideshow of some of the techniques the pupils could use to help them realise their designs (folding, texturing, layering, relief forming), they were all given an Olympic sport and asked to design three discs (15cm, 18cm and 24cm) to illustrate this sport. They then had about three weeks to develop their ideas (under the guidance of their art teacher) with me popping back just to check that they were on course and to persuade them to simplify their ambitious sketches into workable designs. Their sketchbook work was stunning (see illustration below) and it was obvious they took great pride in beautiful pages of accurate drawings and research collage pages about their given sport.



Finally we were ready to start making. For this part they were in three class groups of about twelve, on three different days, and within these groups I staggered their arrival into the DT department four at a time so I could get one group started and able to work independently before the next group arrived. I had brought a lot of my own hammers, swage block and even a small anvil, and the pupils could use the design department's gas forge for annealing their discs in between forming. The process was helped enormously by making sure the students made the elements of their design in cardboard first, so we could talk through any potential problems as they arose.


The whole making process went fairly smoothly and it was a bonus that as some students got the hang of a technique, they could show others. I tried to demonstrate to several students at once but because all the discs were so individual this was only possible 50% of the time. Health and Safety issues were covered by the school, but there seems to be a lot of blonde hair around these days which was in constant need of taming, goggles don't look glamorous, it's always a struggle to find a matching pair of work gloves in the box, and of course tongs stay hot a long time after they come out of the forge; but we got through unscathed, and with a lot of patience from the Design Department's technicians there were no major incidents.

As the term reached its end it was clear that more time was needed, and we fortunately were able to continue into the Spring term. It was a struggle to get all the pupils to produce three discs, for different reasons: because they had more complex designs; a lot of one less-than-exciting technique like filing which slowed them down; or just hadn't been able to make all the sessions due to illness or music lessons; etc...

The next part of the project was really up to me - to fix all the discs onto the globe, which had meanwhile been shotblasted and powder-coated. This took longer than I had anticipated, like some giant puzzle, but made easier by moving the whole project back to my own workshop where I could concentrate better and give the Design Department back their room, free of heavy metal clutter.

At the end of May 2012 we sited the globe on a brick plinth on the school's playing fields (subsequently, the "look" of it has been softened by some effective planting). The grand opening was on the 20th September.

- this case the relationship between designing and making. Stereotypical views which seem to linger of "boys good at tech, girls at art" could be safely blown away, meaning they all learned from each other.
- why school projects may not be as creative as parents would like. Even in a large successful school there are enormous timetable, material and safety restrictions. This is why I feel visiting artists and residencies are essential to help everyone think out of the box occasionally.
- that students in their GCSE years have an enormous amount of coursework to complete, and they are juggling several subjects. Sometimes it was frustrating to see how the globe project quickly became 'just another project' they needed to finish to feed into their coursework, and to meet the deadline for me to create the sculpture with their discs. It would be great to work with a school on a purely process-based project where the techniques and processes could be more fully explored and the residency experience could purely be enjoyed for what it was

Workshop Description:

If you are new to Chasing it is a style of relief work in sheet metal that can be applied to almost anything. From tea pots to battle armour it has been used to create sculptural narrative in metal throughout human history.

For me the art of chasing is a beautiful fusion between illustration and sculpture. The ability to transform any drawing into a three dimensional form is one of the most exciting and challenging aspects of relief work.

What you can expect from this course:

We'll be focusing on building a knowledge base of different chasing techniques, material control, pitch management, and how to use illustration and design to compliment low to high relief work in sheet metal.

Participants can expect to work on up to two projects in 18ga (approx 1mm) copper. The first project is usually a structured follow along design matched to the individual's skill level. If there is time the following projects will be assigned on an individual basis to best complement their growth and interests.

If participants have already taken one of my workshops or completed one of my warm up projects before and are comfortable with tackling something more challenging then they may start a more complicated project immediately.

You may be expected to draw:

It is not a prerequisite as there are many projects that can be traced but drawing is highly encouraged. As sheet metal is shaped it distorts and changes in volume requiring the maker to redraw elements of the design by hand. Certain intermediate to advanced designs can only be made this way, but not to worry if drawing is a newer skill set as we have many available projects that only require tracing.

Bringing a sketchbook or notebook is encouraged.

You may be expected to sculpt in clay:

If your interest is to accomplish your own design in class my prerequisite for that is you must be able to draw your design. You can have this done in advance if you'd like.

In class we will discuss and plan a depth guide for your design with more drawings and a proof sculpture to act as a guide. This method of planning I'll be teaching is a great practice and an important skill for deeper relief work. Plus it's a lot of fun to do which is always ideal.

As mentioned, tooling and materials will be provided for the duration of the course. If you have some of your own tooling you are of course welcome to bring what you are comfortable with.

You are most welcome to bring your own safety gear such as ear and eye protection to make yourself more comfortable as well.

This style of work can happen at any scale so bringing an optivisor or other optical magnification could also be a good idea but is not a must. Though if you think you may struggle with working small the magnification is very helpful.

Class will run from 9am to 5:30pm with a one hour lunch break at 12:30pm.

Participants can be expected to swing a hammer for 7-8 hours a day, the hammers are not very heavy but it should be kept in mind that it is very physical work.

All skill levels welcome!







the CHURCHILL fellowship



We will fund you to spend up to two months discovering new ideas and best practice among leading practitioners anywhere in the world. You can do this in person or online. Then we will help you to write up your ideas as a Report published on our website, to share your insights with your community or sector, and to turn your ideas into action in the UK.

The initial grant covers all expenses for your research phase, including all travel costs. If needed, it also covers interpreters and travel assistants.

The topic you explore is defined by you. It must meet our eligibility criteria, which include offering a practical benefit to UK society. Success will be assessed within your own terms, and may be local or national.

The success of your application for a Fellowship is not affected by your qualifications, background or age. We ask only that you are a UK resident citizen aged 18 or over. We are looking for people with the potential to inspire change.

The support we offer extends beyond the initial grant:

We offer advice and assistance with planning your research and travels, writing up your findings, sharing your knowledge and implementing your ideas.

We promote your ideas and activities on our website and social media channels.

We plug you in to our online Fellows' networks which offer local and thematic contacts and collaborations.

We offer post-research grants for your knowledge-sharing and events.

We maintain contact for as long as you like, and include all Fellows within our community.

Many Fellows start their projects at a local level, in their workplace or locality, and then grow its influence, perhaps to regional or sector level. Some find themselves affecting national levels of policy or services. Almost all say that the Fellowship took them to places and levels they had not expected. In a recent survey, 100% of Fellows said they would recommend a Fellowship to others.

Crucial to this process is the personal and professional growth that comes from a Fellowship. You have an opportunity to take time out of normal life, for learning and thinking. You will be learning in a topic you care about, from leading practitioners you have chosen, anywhere in the world. You will have the status of being a Churchill Fellow, which opens doors overseas and at home. Many Fellows tell us that their ideas were not taken seriously until they became a Fellow, when their voice was fully heard.

Fellows report that these effects are long-lasting. Our survey showed that – as a result of their Fellowship – 77% of Fellows remain globally connected, 61% are leaders in their sector and 77% feel they are more fulfilled professionally. Some 88% said it was a life-changing experience.

The Tonypandy Cup a short history

Many of us will be aware of the Tonypandy Cup, an award that sits at the pinnacle of the Worshipful company of Blacksmiths awards scheme, but are unaware of its origin.

In 1998, Past Prime Warden Lt Col Delwyn Dennis, presented the Tonypandy Cup to the Company. It was given in memory of Lord Tonypandy (George Thomas, Former Speaker of the House of Commons) who was an Honorary Member of the Court of the Worshipful Company of Blacksmiths. The Cup may be awarded annually for a piece which is considered to be an outstanding example of the skill of a blacksmith or blacksmiths.

Tonypandy Award Call for Entries - 2024 Award

The Tonypandy may be awarded annually for a piece which is considered to be an outstanding example of the skill of a blacksmith or blacksmiths.

The Company welcomes suggestions from any source for work, which meets the criteria of "outstanding".

A special panel assesses the nominated pieces. We would welcome applications from British blacksmiths.

All work should be in the UK or Northern Ireland. Work should preferably be accessible to the general public.

Modern and traditional techniques are equally acceptable. Work in any metal and heat process and style is acceptable. The age of the piece should not exceed five years from completion.

Nominations incorporating as much information as possible on the submission should be sent to the Chair of the Tonypandy Committee (details below) along with a digital portfolio of past commissions.

The initial assessment will be by looking at good, high


quality digital photos that show the piece overall and in detail, as the committee will be meeting online. All shortlisted submissions will still be visited and assessed on site.
