I want to travel first.







Maria Cristalli

I started blacksmithing about 27 years ago and quickly realized that I had a lifetime of exploring ahead of me. Needing to further my skills, I was able to apprentice with Japheth Howard and Darryl Nelson. Meanwhile, I shared shop space in a cooperative forge with many other smiths. It was a fun time indeed! Seattle was a boom town then and we all had a lot of work to do for fancy houses. I built up a clientele and was able to do many exciting projects. Most of these were in the more "traditional" style of blacksmithing.

My thoughts on design and forging steel changed to a more modern approach when I was able to assist in a class with E.A. Chase at Penland School of Crafts in North Carolina. He said something to the effect that the job of blacksmiths was to make unique works. That stuck with me. This was at a time when many scrolls and leaves were being produced by factories.


Another turning point in my expression of forged ironwork was directly inspired by the work of Paul Evans, an American metal sculptor and artist, who blurred the boundary between art and furniture. I'd say that started my journey on texturing steel. His cabinets often had fronts with a "patchwork" of many steel sculptural elements in them.

In response, I made a backsplash for our stove using different textured plates. I also started looking at a lot of mid-century and brutalist era work. To me this era definitely combined art and function into buildings, furniture, home décor, etc. I also looked at William Mitchell's art. An English sculptor who did a lot of concrete murals with heavy texture and form.

I then made a couple of fireplace screens where I explored more texture. It was certainly a turning point in my expression, and I was able to get some commissions exploring this work further. I've made a couple of gates using textured plates with vertical bars holding the plates together. Some of these bars are textured, and some have unique forgings. I like to use traditional joinery techniques in assembling the parts. Headed rivets and tenons add to the design. Each new project is a further exploration and expansion of the last.

Along the way, my husband and I moved out of the city to central Washington State. I have a studio on our property in the woods, which houses two air hammers; a 165lb Wolf and a 300lb Nazel. I have made numerous top tools and recently was able to "afford" some insert dies for the Nazel. I use squares, rectangles, fullers, etc of different sizes, among other shapes that I've come up with. Texturing is all about forging shapes into the metal and also moving the metal around underneath the dies in a seemingly random way. What I'm doing actually is composing the textures as I go. I look to keep highs and lows in the steel in a pleasing manner and also allow the steel to express its own movement under the force of the blows. Assembly is also an opportunity to add to the piece. I compose this also as I go along, seeing what shapes look good next to each other. It all manifests in how light plays along the surface. It makes your eye dance along the piece.




Gate detail

Extra texture continued

Texture is not the only way I express forged ironwork. I also forge sculpture that may be explained as exaggerated plant forms. I explore fluid and bold forms that to me look modern as well as tactile and graceful.

My last big public art piece is called "Elidi, gift of the sun". It is at a resort community near where Hive. My thoughts on the design were that I wanted to see something that would pop out at you and have some mass. Something that wouldn't get lost in the trees and grass but would compliment them. A circle came to mind right away. A circle suggests energy and power, along with harmony, protection and community. They feel unified and symbolize the cycle of time. Time is another reference I thought about for this sculpture. The timeless sun and moon, allowing life and the cycle of the seasons. I thought about time with the history of the site; a coal mining town. Coal is often called buried sunshine as it stores the energy of the sun from plant life millions of years ago. I've seen the tools that the miners used. Wheels on the mining carts that allowed the coal to come out of the earth, and forged steel tools, made by the blacksmiths that used to live here. The tools are all rusty now but remind us of the passage of time and our local history.

This was an immensely fun project to work on. I had a fellow smith, Jorgen Harle, here helping me out for two months, along with Jim Garrett who came out for a week while we were forging the heavy vertical bars. Jorgen got my equipment up to par for such large forgings. He built a large forge and made the insert dies. We worked very hard, but it certainly was a highlight of the year. It is so enjoyable to work with peers in your field.

Two artist grants that I was awarded last year afforded me some time after my big project to make some sculpture. I would like to

be able to focus my time now to just making sculpture. I hope to be rewarded with some more public art projects in the future and keep exploring what I can make in forged steel.



Rachel Reckitt Retrospective Chance Encounters

Opens at the Museum of Somerset 19th October 2024 - 15th March 2025

The life and works of a remarkable Somerset artist, with a daringly independent spirit, are being celebrated in a new exhibition opening at the Museum of Somerset on 19 October.

Rachel Reckitt (1908-1995) was a 20th-century modernist artist who lived and worked in West Somerset for over 60 years. She was a unique-artistic talent who worked entirely on her own terms, even training as a blacksmith when she was in her 60s. Reckitt is amongst previously overlooked female artists to feature in a new film, War Paint – Women at War. This feature documentary, by BAFTA awardwinning director Margy Kinmonth, champions the powerful female perspective of conflict through art.

Sarah Cox, Exhibitions Manager at the South West Heritage Trust, said: "Reckitt was a woman who, in many ways, rejected the conventions of her time, gender and class. Her lifelong artistic endeavor, inspired by her astute observations of people and places, spans avant garde painting, sculpture, wood engraving and blacksmithing. We are delighted that this new exhibition and documentary film will shine a light on the achievements of this inimitable Somerset artist."

In preparation for the exhibition the South West Heritage Trust has acquired 13 new works by Reckitt, adding to its growing collection of works by local female artists. Amongst them is Ruins which was painted by Reckitt whilst travelling in Sweden, shortly before the outbreak of the Second World War.

Ruins will be displayed alongside paintings, sculpture and wood engravings on loan from public and private collections. Highlights include the RAF Museum's Spanish Refugee Family, which further shines a light on her wartime experiences. In 1939 Reckitt moved from Somerset to London to support the war effort, helping to evacuate families from the city and sending children to Golsoncott, her family home in Somerset, which became a nursery.

War Paint Director Margy Kinmonth said: "I am delighted to have discovered the work of Reckitt, an exceptionally talented artist who has not had popular recognition, until now. I am proud to showcase her conflict work in the film, looking in detail at her wood engravings and oils of bombdamaged London and the refugee crisis during the Blitz. Reckitt's talent at capturing the detail of domesticity and homelessness in her art is exceptionally moving and she stands out as another great, but previously overlooked, female British artist."

The exhibition is supported by the Golsoncott Foundation, a charitable Trust established to support the arts as part of Reckitt's legacy.

Penelope Lively, Rachel Reckitt's niece and Trustee of the Foundation said: "We are delighted that this comprehensive exhibition will bring my aunt's work to a larger audience. She was a central figure in my life, and I watched and marvelled at her versatility, up to and beyond her recreation of herself in later years as one of the few women artist blacksmiths."

The exhibition, Chance Encounters: The Art of Rachel Reckitt, opens at the Museum of Somerset, 19 October 2024 – 15 March 2025. It will be supported by a programme of events including gallery tours, family activities and an engagement programme for schools.

BRIEF: INVITATION TO MAKE PROPOSALS

OPPORTUNITY 1: Open to Blacksmiths under the age of 30 (at any stage in their career) PRIZE of £2,000.00

To design an original work to be included in the "Earth, Fire, Iron" Exhibition.

Designs can be sculptural or functional and may be wall hung, displayed on a plinth or floor standing. Only works not exceeding 1meter square can be considered for display in the main gallery. Larger works would need to be displayed in the walled garden (i.e., wallwork, bowl, sculpture bird feeder/bath, boot scraper etc).

Submission Criteria

- 1. The proposer must be 30yrs old or younger on September 1st 2025
- 2.Design proposals / drawings must be submitted digitally by 28th February 2025
- 3.Photographs of student work and experimental samples may be used as examples of work to date & portfolio images to support your design submission.
- 4. All submissions must be your own designs and original.
- 5. All submissions must be sent to secretary@baba.org.uk
- 6. You must be able to complete the work and deliver to Museum in the Park Stroud by September 1st 2025.
- 7. Being a BABA member is not a requirement for applying.

OPPORTUNITY 2: Open to younger or less experienced smith, under the age of 35 and a Master Smith.

MENTORED PROJECT- Award 2 X £1,000.00

- •Master Smiths are offering their time, experience, and generosity to work with and support a young artist-blacksmith through the process of designing, detailed design and making a unique work.
- The objective is to inspire confidence and help develop the abilities to achieve an outstanding outcome from an original design.
- •Mentor and 'apprentice' will receive £1000 each for design, the collaboration, all materials, the forging and completing the work.
- This opportunity will be one of the main demonstrations at the BABA AGM so preparatory work should be in place so the work can be completed over the AGM weekend.

Brief:

- The young artist blacksmiths must make the application with their own design concept. A master Smith/mentor may be chosen or appointed to support the development of the concept, demonstration preparation and the making of the proposed design during the two-day event.
- A proposed, larger exterior work will need to be displayed in the museum gardens. It must be robust, integrating a stand (if necessary) to enable it to be stable when installed in the garden terraces.
- A smaller interior work where possible may be displayed within the main gallery or the museum entrance area if necessary.
- Consideration of function (if that is the proposal) is crucial.
- Consideration of the environment the garden, including the arboretum and sensory garden, nature, recycling, re-using are important aspects.

Submission Criteria

- 1. The proposer must be 35yrs old or younger on September 1st 2025
- 2. Design proposals / drawings must be submitted digitally by 28th February 2025
- 3. Photographs of student work and experimental samples may also be used as examples of work to date & portfolio images to support your design submission.
- 4. All submissions must be your own designs and original.

OPPORTUNITY 3: DESIGN AND MAKE A SMALL LEARNING TABLE

Award 2 X £250.00

A collaboration between a younger/less experienced smith, a Master Smith and others at the AGM!

- Master Smiths are offering their time, experience, and generosity to work with and support a young artist-blacksmith through the process of designing, developing and making a small "learning table" for the Museum (approx. 1m sq.) The intention is to inspire confidence and help develop abilities to achieve an outstanding outcome from an original design.
- Mentor and 'apprentice' will receive an honorarium of £250 each for design, and the collaboration. All materials (including tabletop) to be supplied by BABA.
- The making of the table will be a collaborative demonstration during the BABA AGM and may involve other smiths in the making but is to be led by the designer and mentor.
- The forging of items to go the table, simple 'tools & materials of the trade' and examples of small, forged works will be forged by other smiths during the event. This will give children the opportunity to see and hold examples of small works, their shapes, smells, weights, textures/finishes, and make their own simple drawings and designs.

Submission Criteria

- 1. The proposer must be 35yrs old or younger on September 1st 2025
- 2. Design proposals / drawings must be submitted digitally by 28th February 2025
- 3. Photographs of student work and experimental samples may also be used as examples of work to date & portfolio images to support your design submission.
- 4. All submissions must be your own designs and original.
- 5. Your submission must specify requirements for all materials including the tabletop.
- 6. All submissions must be sent to secretary@baba.org.uk
- 7. You must be available along with your mentor to demonstrate the making of your proposal during the BABA event 12-14 September 2025
- 8. Being a BABA member is not a requirement for applying.

OPPORTUNITY 4: OPEN COMPETITION

Budget £3,000.00

To design and make a small pedestrian gate for the Bisley Community Composting Scheme. Alan Evans volunteered on this scheme and as it celebrates its 20th year in 2025 this commission is in part to remember Alan's work. Open to all blacksmiths (mentoring support available in the making process only if required).

The gate dimensions are 120cm x 120cm. The fixings elements of the current gate extend the width to 140cm

- The gate must be functional, and simple, reflecting the circular recycling system of the composting process.
- The gate must integrate fixings to the adjacent wooden posts.
- The latch must be integral to the design.
- The gate must be designed to lock, ideally coded for members, and the lock must be integral to the design.
- Appropriate corrosion protection is required.
- The fee is for all design work, site visit(s), labour, transport, all materials, fixings and installation.
- The commission will be exhibited in the "Inspired" part of the exhibition and installed on site after the show.

Submission Criteria

- 1. No age restriction
- 2. Design proposals / drawings must be submitted digitally by 28th February 2025

All short courses

Blacksmithing - Intermediate

About the course

This practical course is designed for candidates who have completed the Introduction to Blacksmithing course and would like to progress and improve their blacksmithing skills further in a supportive environment. Candidates will learn a range of different construction techniques to produce a small decorative bracket.

The course will cover: forging, forming, cutting and joining; riveting; collaring; tenon joint. Toolmaking will also be included in this course

Blacksmithing introduction - Daytime

About the course:

During this practical course you are encouraged to learn at your own pace to produce small decorative pieces and tools. You will learn the skills of:

Fire management; forging; forming and cutting & joining.

As experience is gained, learners are encouraged to develop their own projects.

Blacksmithing introduction - Evening

About the course:

During this practical course you are encouraged to learn at your own pace to produce small decorative pieces and tools.

You will learn the skills of: Fire management; forging; forming and cutting & joining. As experience is gained, learners are encouraged to develop their own projects.

Blacksmithing - One day workshop

About the course

Learn the fundamental principles of the art of blacksmithing, including the techniques and skills necessary to make your own blacksmithing pieces.

Blacksmithing - Tool making

About the course

Learn the fundamental principles of the art of blacksmithing, including the techniques and skills necessary to make your own blacksmithing tools, in this 3-day course

Looking through the short courses on offering, I personally found this one sounding interesting as well:

Fabrication - Introduction

About the course

This three-day short course is intended for beginners who have a keen interest in any form of fabrication.

During the course, you will learn:

- * How to measure, mark out and cut materials and use the required equipment.
- * Gain experience on all hand tools and machinery in the workshop, including: an up-to-date plasma table and hand plasma; guillotine; pillar drills; bandsaws; box pan folders; rollers; grinders; sanders and cutting disks.
- * Fixing and joining methods such as bolts, rivets, pilot holes, tap and dyes and spot welding.
- * Safe working practices and health and safety procedures.

At the end of the course, you will get to take home two small projects you have fabricated and then, if you wish, progress onto other short courses such as welding.



Maker Relief Fund

Support for Craftspeople who need it most

Many craftspeople are facing significant challenges in sustaining their practice, due to a combination of financial pressures and systemic marginalising factors. Heritage Crafts' Maker Relief Fund is targeted at people facing financial hardship while striving to make their living as a professional craftsperson.

It is based on the principles that:

- * the best way to safeguard the UK's intangible craft heritage is to support the individuals within whom that knowledge and skill resides; and
- * such individuals are the best arbiters of their own need, deserve to be treated with dignity, and rarely benefit from being subjected to undue bureaucratic demands or the judgement of strangers.

The fund will award 50 grants of £1,000 over a 12 month period to practising professional craftspeople who are based in the UK, are over the age of 18, and who consider themselves to be in one or more of the following categories:

- * people on low incomes;
- * working class people;
- * Black and ethnically diverse people, including Gypsy, Roma and Travellers;
- * people with disabilities, who identify as neuro-divergent, and/or have chronic physical or mental health issues;
- * members of the LGBTQIA+ community; or
- * people with caring responsibilities.

Grant details:

Recipients will be identified from all the eligible entries received by midnight on the 15th day of each month, between November 2024 and October 2025 inclusive.

The following number of grants will be allocated in each month:

November 2024: 5 December 2024: 6 January 2025: 6 February 2025: 5 March 2025: 4 April 2025: 3 May 2025: 3 July 2025: 3 August 2025: 3 September 2025: 4 October 2025: 5

^{*} Grants do not have to be used for business costs; they can be used for general living costs or other purposes according to the needs of the recipient. Heritage Crafts will not require evidence of expenditure.

- * All eligible submissions received by midnight on the 15th day of each month (between November 2024 and October 2025 inclusive) will be in with a chance of being awarded a grant be the end of that month.
- * All applicants will be informed if they have been successful or unsuccessful.
- * Successful candidates will not be named or publicised, but be encouraged to keep in touch with Heritage Crafts in case it can offer further support and to hear whether the grant made a difference.
- * Unsuccessful candidates will automatically remain available for selection in all subsequent months in which the grants are offered, unless they request to be removed from consideration.
- * The selection will be made each month by a panel of staff/Trustees and an independent observer, and recorded for compliance purposes, though the recording will not be made public or shared, other than by request to the Charity Commission or relevant law-enforcement agencies, as required by law.






